	<ul> <li>The student will be expected to demonstrate proficiency in Mandarin at the basic level in:</li> <li>1. Aural comprehension of simple discourse</li> <li>2. Reading comprehension of simplified texts, in both Pinyin and Chinese letters</li> <li>3. Speech delivery: extend greetings, express needs, ask questions and give replies</li> <li>4. Written expression: simple sentences and short dialogues, in Chinese characters</li> <li>5. Understanding target cultures</li> </ul>

	<ul> <li>Systematic introduction of:</li> <li>1. Basic syntactic structures (daily expressions and some idiomatic phrases)</li> <li>2. Basic lexicon (up to 200 lexical items)</li> <li>3. Basic strokes and components of Chinese characters</li> <li>4. The phonological system of Mandarin (Pinyin or romanized Chinese phonetic transcription, including tones)</li> <li>5. Some aspects of the Chinese culture</li> </ul>
0:	Methods of Instruction The functional and communicative approach is used where appropriate. Classroom activities include: presentation of material by the instructor, practice in pairs and small groups, listening comprehension, audio- visual presentations, and conversation labs in small groups with a Native Language Assistant.

	Ralph Lake, Tom Whalley and Christine Hsu. <i>Basic Chinese: An Introductory Course in Mandarin</i> (Douglas College, 2000). Coursepack includes: text, workbook, and toolkit (aids to learning: pinyin chart, instructions for writing all characters, readings).
Q:	Means of Assessment The evaluation system consists of weekly tests from 3 <sup>rd</sup> and 4 <sup>th</sup> week to end of semester and weekly homework assignments. Each test consists of written and listening elements. An oral test is conducted near the end of semester. Course concludes with a comprehensive final exam. The minimum mark to pass the course is a P in both the written and oral aspects of the course. In order to continue to the next level (MODL 1192), a student must achieve a minimum grade of C.
